Lapidary Corner

Featuring Don Deycous

Don told me that he started playing around with rockhounding in the mid 1970s. Along with his father-in-law, Arlie Christian, he joined the Ginkgo Mineral Society in the early 1980s. A few years after that, he started making calibrated cabochons. Don didn't like the fact that using a template to fashion cabs created a lot of waste, so he decided to learn how to do silversmithing.

The only issue was that he didn't know how to do it and there weren't any classes he could take. That being the case, Don taught himself. He said, "The first few attempts were kind of rough but I kept at it." As his skill level grew, he made bracelets, earrings, rings and pendants; featuring single and multiple free formed stones. A few years later, he entered a bola tie with a fire agate set in sterling silver in the Chelan County Fair. It took Best of Show.

Don began subscribing to Rock and Gem Magazine about 50 years ago. He has donated some of these to the club and they have been used as raffle prizes. Unfortunately, he lost a lot of the early issues in a fire. The national publication had a feature titled, Craftsman of the Month. Don submitted photos of a business card holder that was made of Saddle Mountain Petrified Wood for consideration and he was selected as the Craftsman of the Month for August 2011.

Don explained that he used to have a booth set up on C Street in front of the Court House in Ephrata where he sold his wares. He wanted a better way to display his business cards and that led to him creating the pet wood card holder.

Nine years ago, Don and his wife Arla, took a Viking Grand European 16-day River Cruise on the Danube River. The cruise started in Amsterdam and concluded in Budapest. After the cruise, they spent a couple more days in Budapest before returning home. Don said that they stayed at a fairly new Hilton Hotel. He went on to say that when they did the excavation for the construction, they found some artifacts that were on display at the hotel. Along with the artifacts, there were two slabs of petrified wood that were mounted on customized metal stands.

Don said, "I have been to Rock Shows all over the country and I had never seen displays like those." He went on to say, "I can't believe that I had to travel all the way to Hungary to see those kinds of displays." Of course, this led him to determine to make similar displays.

Don had spent many years at Saddle Mountain searching for and finding Petrified Wood, so he had plenty of raw material. He also has a 24 inch saw that he made himself about 10 years ago. He told me that, at the time, the blade cost \$550 back then. He said that he made this saw to replace an 18-inch Highland Park saw so he could cut larger material. He also already had an angled flat lap grinder with a water attachment that used self-adhering diamond pads ranging in grit from 50 to 13,000. He used cerium oxide on felt to achieve the final mirror finish. Don also owned a metal saw that made clean cuts that he used for various projects. It was used to cut the metal for the stands. He then used a wire-feed welder to construct the pieces.

Pictured below are some his wonderful displays. Please note the way Don custom built the stands to cradle each specimen. The first one is Carnelian Agate that Don thinks came from the westside of the mountains. He explained that carnelian had been found on Weyerhaeuser land that had been clearcut. After it was logged off, new trees were planted. Then people went up there and dug up not only agate but also a lot of the young trees. This prompted the installation of a gate across the road and a sign that read, "Survivors Will Be Prosecuted!" Don can't say for sure that this was the source of this piece as he bought it but this is his best guess. The second piece is Pet Wood from Wyoming that he bought at an estate sale. The other specimens were collected by Don on Saddle Mountain.
