Meet Your Fellow Club Members

Susan Oglebay



Susan Oglebay grew up in Maryland right next door to Washington DC. She was always attracted to rocks as a kid. She told me that her older brother played little league baseball and that while his games were going on, she would wander around looking for shiny rocks. It was while doing this that she found her first crystals. When she got a little older-she guesses around 12 or so, she would catch a bus to the Smithsonian Institute. She loved the gift shop there because it had lots of rocks and minerals for sale and she was a very willing customer.

After graduating high school, Susan attended the University of South Carolina with the intention of becoming a veterinarian, as she has always had a love of animals as you can see from the picture above. While there, she obtained a degree in psychology and earned about 90 percent of the credits necessary to also get a degree in chemistry. Many years later, she attended the University of Maryland to complete the chemistry degree.

She planned to pursue a master's degree but she changed her mind and opted instead to attend law school at George Washington University in DC. Her first job after law school, was with the Southwest Virginia Legal Aid Society. She had an intense interest in doing legal aid work, so this was a good fit for her.

It was sometime in the 1980s that she was asked by a colleague to form a private law practice which she agreed to do. A few years later, she accepted the position of Assistant Commonwealth Attorney of Virginia. This job which was essentially as a prosecuting attorney was half-time, allowing her to continue with her private practice. She told me, "When I was in Virginia, I found lots of interesting jaspers that were brought in with other material to line the railroad tracks." She went on to say that she wasn't sure exactly where the jasper came from, though it was quite likely somewhere in the Appalachian Mountains. It was around this same time that she purchased a Thumler Rock Tumbler that she saw in a catalog.

Susan also worked for the United Mine Workers of American District 28. There, she expanded her base of knowledge to include Black Lung litigation, worker's compensation and some collective bargaining for when the miners would go on strike. She continued in private practice, where she had occasion to work on a couple of First Amendment cases until 2008, when she left to move to Lincoln County, WA. She put her career on hold for a year and then took a job with the Grant County Public Defense. She moved to Ephrata in 2009 and has been there ever since. Susan retired from the Public Defenders Office in 2020 which was the same year that she joined the Ginkgo Mineral Society.

Susan joined the online group, rocktumbling.com. She explained to me that the group focuses on all types of lapidary and not just tumbling. One day, Susan saw a post from a very talented wire wrapper named Tela Formosa, who wanted to trade wire wrapping for some finished cabs. Susan responded and that led the two of them to not just exchanging cabs and wrapped pieces but also becoming online friends and eventually meeting in person. Tela taught Susan the art of wire wrapping and when Tela decided to write a book focusing on wrapping designs, she asked Susan to edit it. Of course, Susan agreed. Sadly, the book is no longer available for purchase, but Susan is happy that she still has a copy.

Susan has been cabbing and wire wrapping since approximately 2010. She said, "I started making jewelry for an excuse to play with rocks." She added that she gets a lot of inspiration from rocktumbling.com but that she designs all

of the pieces herself. She then went on to say, "I start by sketching the piece five or six times but it always turns out differently than what I originally sketched because although I'm comfortable with designing, I'm lousy at the execution of the design and often have to make modifications because the original design wouldn't work."

Susan will sometimes wrap a piece for someone else. She said that she never charges to do it and that she also gives her jewelry to friends. I asked her if she ever sold any of her pieces. Her response was, "rarely." She went on to say, "I usually donate them for the Animal SOS Auction so they can pull dogs from death row and perform free spaying and neutering." A lot have also been donated to Animal Aid Unlimited (a rescue and treatment for street animals in India, although the founders are from Seattle.) Like I said at the beginning of this story, she's an animal lover.

This month we are featuring the lapidary work of Susan Oglebay. All of the wire wrapping in these pieces was done by her. In addition, she also does some soldering and forming. Most of the stones were shaped and polished by her as well. 
